Amazing Tour of the Elk Grove Food Bank Services

Last month 14 members toured the Elk Grove Food Bank Services facility and brought donations. It was an amazing tour lead by Valerie Erwin, Community Outreach Manager of the Food Bank.

Valerie walked us through the different operations of the Food Bank - from accepting donations to distributing food - and everything in between. Our last stop was Cathy's Clothes Closet and the Children's Bookstore, which is also located at the Food Bank.

Here are some interesting facts about the Food Bank:

- The Food Bank has been serving the community since 1974.
- They serve approximately 8,200 people each month.
- · Area they cover: Elk Grove region, South Sacramento, and surrounding areas of South County.
- 94% of every dollar donated to the Food Bank goes directly to programs and services.
- Every \$1 provides up to 4 meals.
- In 2020, they distributed over 1.1 million meals.

The Food Bank provides the following services:

- · Emergency food distribution
- USDA Food and Commodity Supplemental Food Program for Seniors (CSFP)
- · Mobile food distribution to senior sites
- · Mobile food distribution to subsidized housing sites for families
- Mobile food distribution to migrant farm workers
- · Wellness bag delivery to people who are housebound and medically fragile
- · Clothes Closet for individuals, families, and children
- · Veterans assistance
- · CalFresh (food stamps) application assistance
- Pet Pantry
- · Annual Thanksgiving Turkey Drive

Tomato Time! ~~~~~~~~~

By tomato time, I mean seeds not plants! I saw baby tomato plants at Green Acres in mid-February. Unless you have a greenhouse or a very good place to grow them with plenty of direct sun in your home, DON'T BUY PLANTS YET! It's just too cold overnight for them to grow and there is some research that indicates planting members of the nightshade family (including peppers and eggplants) in cold soil can damage them permanently. They definitely don't produce fruit any faster than waiting till the weather warms up. The soil should be at least 65 degrees before they will be happy living in it. Patience!

Okay, enough Master Gardener soap box. 😊



Plant seeds now if you want to grow a variety not commonly grown in nurseries. I love one called 'Black Prince' (an heirloom that enthusiastically grows clusters of 2-inch fruits), and 'Grandeur' (a hybrid slicing red tomato from Japan).

I'll wait to buy plants of 'Juliet' (great for dehydrating) till the weather and soil warm up by the end of April.

'Black Prince'



I started with 'Black Prince' by getting it as a small plant one year with the wrong label—this really isn't a 'Green Zebra!" During the ID process, I learned that tomatoes with "green shoulders," (ripening fruit remains green at the stem end until it is fully ripe) are heirlooms. Not all heirloom tomatoes have green shoulders, but the green indicates it is an heirloom. Tomato hybridizers got rid of this trait because consumers wanted solid red tomatoes!



'Grandeur'

A note on Kitazawa Seed Company. They are a bay area company recently purchased by a larger company. You can still find their Asian plant seeds if you Google Kitazawa. They also have a great Japanese eggplant I grow from seed called 'Shoya.'

Book Club Pick for Spring The Indigo Girl by Natasha Boyd

Recommended by Olinda Cortez and Mary Tolan-Davi

Set on South Carolina's plantations beginning in 1739, this excellent historical novel is based on the true story of Eliza Lucas Pinckney (1722–1793). Sixteen-year-old Eliza Lucas is charged with running her father's three heavily-mortgaged plantations while he pursues a military career in the Caribbean. He has trained Eliza well

in business, agriculture, and plantation management, and she is bright, considerate, and ambitious.

Eliza sees the production of indigo dye as the family's financial salvation, but indigo is risky to grow, and dye-making is a valuable but well-kept secret so she must approach her new assignment with caution. Kindhearted Eliza is independent and forward-thinking. She defies the Negro Act of 1740 and teaches her slaves to read, seeks their advice, and banishes the lash.

As a marriageable young woman she rejects all suitors and expects to be a spinster, but as the plantation booms and her public stature grows, so does her affection for a married gentleman friend. Add threats of war with Spain and the strict social and cultural codes for Southern women, and Boyd has crafted a captivating novel of Southern colonial history.

I wrote down 2 pages of notes and now I'll try to give you the most interesting items, well, to me anyway. Here's one of my strings of words: Tapestry Garden, less water, bees, butterflies and birds. Yes that makes sense, and I'm happy to know that bees, butterflies and birds are trending. House plants are hot, and I loved the photo of a Rattlesnake plant. Debbie says any flower that makes you smile is hot, and she used Sunflowers as her example.

She touched on easy care roses. I wrote down 1-2" rose, self cleaning, no deadheading, flowers fall off, and no rose hips; sounds great. Debbie says that Julia Child had the privilege of selecting the rose she wanted to bear her name, and she picked a yellow floribunda because it was the color of butter.

She covered hydrangea mania, and recommended Lace Cap Dolly Diva Ballerina. My favorite plant picture was near the end, a fairly small grass called Little Blue Stem. It is stunning.
